

Challenges & Opportunities

- The Penticton Museum & Archives is continually looking for new ways to engage the public and attract new participants to its programs and displays. Our new Hands-on-Heritage Lab gives the museum a new means to attract families. Unlike static museum displays, the Heritage Lab can be described as an ongoing project where new activities and programs can be planned and introduced.
- For the Penticton museum, staying relevant to the community through innovative programming and exhibits remains our biggest challenge and largest opportunity. We collaborate with the Penticton Public Library, the Shatford Centre and other institutions and groups to develop innovative and collaborative programs, exhibits and events.



2019 Initiatives

- Consult with the Penticton Indian Band on a revamping of the First Peoples display area, and secure grants to fund this initiative.
- Work with Penticton Indian Band to establish a First Peoples Heritage Garden.
- Curate and build two new off-site museum displays.
