What is Economic Development? Why is it important to Penticton?

Penticton, Economic Development is a division within Development Services Department which also is home to the Planning, Bylaw, Building, and Business Licensing functions delivered by the City. It is a common misunderstanding that Economic Development is solely focussed on business. This is very simplified. Economic Development is a tool to look at ways that a community can grow and prosper such that it can weather unexpected situations such as emergencies or large



economic changes. It is important to also consider the wellbeing of the community, housing inventory, education opportunities, and greater market forces.

Part of delivering good Economic Development support to community is understanding the needs and challenges of the existing businesses and delivering programs tailored to these. At this point in time, Penticton is focused on Business Retention and Expansion. Recent studies of the region indicate that forecasted changes in the labour market across BC will make it more challenging for employers to find and retain skilled labour.

We need to better understand what kind of training needs to be offered to our existing residents and who

else needs to move here to fill these positions. The next few months are being committed to a formal survey and questionnaire process of Penticton business to ensure we have the best and most current information. Input from this process and findings from recent studies will feed into a 5-year Economic Development Plan with measurable goals. The timing of this survey couldn't be better. As the City continues the Official Community Plan review process, the information from the business community can be interleaved with the community feedback on visioning the future of the entire city.

What is an Economic Investment Zone (EIZ)? Why does the City have one?

An EIZ is a designated area of the City where special Bylaws apply, to encourage business and development activity that help to grow the economy.

The main benefits to having an EIZ are: atttract new businesses, assist in existing businesses reinvest in their Penticton location, increase tax revenue, and create new jobs and opportunities. The Economcic Investment Zones are also for strategic wishes of the citizens,

an example of this would be a downtown grocery store.

Revitialization tax exemptions are a tool that municipalities may use to encourage various types of revitalization to achieve a range of environmental, economic, or social objectives.

EIZ benefits our community through environmental, economic and social benefits through new development.
