# **Deer proof your property**


To help mitigate the number of urban deer, Penticton residents are encourage to do the following:

- Make your yard feel unsafe for deer. Clear brush away from the perimeter to reduce 'cover' and discourage bedding down areas
- Discourage deer from hanging around your property. Make them feel vulnerable so they move on. Direct a garden hose at them, or use a loud shaker can.

# **New signs to improve public feedback**

The City of Penticton has launched a new sign standard aimed at better informing residents of proposed developments being considered in their neighbourhood. Using a design that is bigger, features vibrant colours, clear imagery and large text, the new appearance seeks to improve the role that signs play in providing notice of development to passing neighbours, pedestrians and motorists.

"When trying to attract attention, nothing beats a clear sign," said Planning Manager, Blake Levan. "In the past, notice of development signs were notorious for their awkward appearance and inconsistent assembly of information concerning what's being proposed or how to provide feedback. The City's new signs balance the requirement to share proposed development details while using a noticeable and readable format."

## **Recreation program keeps youth engaged**

The City of Penticton's Recreation Department has teamed up with Oranj Fitness, CrossFit Penticton, and DancePl3y to successfully run another Girls Expanding Boundaries (G.E.B) program.

Girls Expanding Boundaries is a free 6 week program that introduces young women, ages 11-13, to a variety of different recreation activities, each lead by a strong female role model from the community. Participants are selected by education professionals within the school district based on specific criteria.

"Our goal is to help keep our youth motivated and engaged as they move into being young adults," says Recreation Business Supervisor, Kelsey Johnson. "Our program leader, Tammy Semple, hopes to inspire young girls with experiences that could change their outlook on life."

### Working together to improve recycling program

A local multifamily building and the City are taking steps together to reduce common contaminants from entering the recycling stream through the installation of educational signage.

The new signage features easy to distinguish images of common materials acceptable for recycling in the residential program, alongside tips on how to prepare the packaging before placing it in the bin. Also shown are common materials that are prohibited in the residential stream, such as electronics, furniture, black garbage bags and clothing.



"Partnerships between the City and multifamily buildings are effective in lowering the contamination rate of recyclable materials," said Community Sustainability Coordinator, David Kassian. "Working together to develop educational signage and tools will help residents to better understand what is, and what is not, recyclable from their home."

"In 2018, the City of Penticton helped us extensively with our recycling program by providing educational material which we distributed to each suite, conducting audits of the contents of our bin by students during the summer, the results of which we shared with our residents to highlight the problems we were having, and provided the design for the recycling bin sign we had made locally for a very reasonable price," said Vice-President of Athens Creek Towers, Lawrence Godby. "Together, all of these efforts have substantially reduced the amount of inappropriate materials being deposited in our recycling bin."
