Peter Vogellar received a Fine Arts Diploma from Kootenay School of the Arts in 1976, majoring in Sculpture and Printmaking. Beginning with numerous exhibitions of watercolour works in '80s and '90s, Peter then got into snow, sand and ice sculpture. Peter's sculptures have represented Canada at two Winter Olympics, winning first prize and people's choice at the 2006 games in Torino, Italy. For the past 20 years, he has made a living as professional sculptor, with works in concrete, steel, bronze and stone in addition to the aforementioned ephemeral media.

Description: I am dismayed at the great number of species which have gone extinct in recent years. Here, Gaia raises her head in sorrow. Here I show 15 species we lost in the past 30 years. We must do better.

Ancient Wisdoms

Kyle has been full time in both the artistic and architectural blacksmithing fields since 2005. Through commissioned works, functional pieces, architectural metalwork, and exhibitions he is deeply committed to the practice. Kyle finds blacksmithing totally engaging with both intellectual and physical demands — visualizing a goal, establishing the creation process, and acting on that plan with a mind open to alterations and innovations in form. This progression requires handling multiple images in rapid succession: the fire, the plasticity of the iron, the feel of the hammer, and the expectations for shape — a process that is exciting and sustaining. Kyle uses both traditional techniques and modern processes to maximize the properties and integrity of the steel; the design possibilities with metal are infinite.

Description: Conifer pines, with their ancient wisdoms, symbolize the cycles of life and suggest resilience and optimism. Even during hardship, their seeds lie protected, the patient cones waiting to unfurl until conditions are right for new life.

Quantum Entanglement

David was born near Quebec City and moved every couple of years, spending two of them in Africa, until he was 15 when his family settled in Montreal. At 19 he was ready to go out in the world and went to work in B.C. tree planting, which would allow him to travel the world, first to Europe then India. In 1992 he met his wife Christine in Nelson B.C., with whom he now has two beautiful daughters. David attended the Kootenay School of the Arts between 1992 and 1995. As a student he focused on stone, ceramics, metal and jewelry. Gradually, he moved more towards sculpting with ephemeral objects like sand, snow and ice. He has won numerous awards, beginning in 2003 at the World Championships in Harrison Hot Springs and continuing to win ever since at various international events.

Description: A man beast, Ducharme's sculpture is imaginative and inventive. It portrays a muscled, loin-clothed human figure with burnished rods rising vertically from his head, back, shoulders and arms. His creation crouches contemplatively, hands and fingers poised as if caught between worlds as the title suggests. "This being, in my mind, crosses over worlds for a second, filled with wonder, uncertainty, and openness," says Ducharme.

Description: Standard Wire Dachshunds are always joyful with a vigorously wagging tail. They are vertically challenged, horizontally unbalanced and yet magnificent athletes who leap up onto anything. When one foot is up the chase is on.

Andy Davies is a sculptor of public space. From ephemeral water drawings to permanent public sculptures, Davies adores the politics and personality of the public domain. He has five major commissions spanning from Thunder Day, ON, to White Rock, BC. He graduated at the top of his class from the University of Lethbridge in 2009 with a B.F.A. / B.Ed. Davies is based in Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada.

Description: We search for water and hope for life on the Moon and Mars. Meanwhile, Saturn's moon, Enceladus has an ice-capped ocean 60km deep and geysers spewing water vapour into space. Look no further. Saturn Bench is the coming together of two worlds for Davies: sculpture and design. Whether this is "functional sculpture" or "sculptural design" is mere semantics. There is much more to come in this realm.
