
Born in Quebec in 1943, Jean moved to BC in 1965 and settled in the Okanagan with

#### **Ancient Wisdoms**

Kyle has been full time in both the artistic and architectural blacksmithing fields since 2005. Through commissioned works, functional pieces, architectural metalwork, and exhibitions he is deeply committed to the practice. Kyle finds blacksmithing totally engaging with both intellectual and physical demands — visualizing a goal, establishing the creation process, and acting on that plan with a mind open to alterations and innovations in form. This progression requires handling multiple images in rapid succession: the fire, the plasticity of the iron, the feel of the hammer, and the expectations for shape — a process that is exciting and sustaining. Kyle uses both traditional techniques and modern processes to maximize the properties and integrity of the steel; the design possibilities with metal are infinite.

**Description:** Conifer pines, with their ancient wisdoms, symbolize the cycles of life and suggest resilience and optimism. Even during hardship, their seeds lie protected, the patient cones waiting to unfurl until conditions are right for new life.

from Langara College and Digital Art and Design from Thompson Rivers University. William believes in lifelong education, adding welding and project management courses recently to his education to enhance his public art.

With over 25 years of experience working as a commercial artist, graphic designer and illustrator, William is currently pursuing a career in sustainable public art, as well as creating fine art made from both recycled materials and natural stone mosaic tile.



**Description:** The piece is comprised of aluminum rings welded together with colorful acrylic panels that are etched with individual textures and patterns that represent nature on the bottom and a transition to digital as we go up. The sculpture grew from the Artist's desire to create a personal piece using remnant aluminum to keep as small a carbon footprint as possible while calling attention the subtle purveyance of digital technology into our culture. Representing our shared relationship with nature, and our transition from an analogue to digital society, this piece puts at odds our dependency and love for the natural world around us with our rapid integration of technology.

**Description:** GIGASPIDER is a whimsical and colourful pop art installation that is 100% upcycled from scrap auto parts, a compressor tank, resin ball and used pipe. It incorporates two small solar panels that illuminate the red LED eyes at night.


**Description:** A mosaic sculpture depicting a Ukrainian doll wearing the cloak of a

Monarch butterfly. On the back, one can see the Monarch caterpillar crawling in foliage. Strength and fragility – the monarch butterfly exemplifies both. One wingbeat at a time, these tiny creatures prove the connection between here and there, familiar and far. Their mysterious instinct connects generations — it's all one world in time and space.



#### Intersect

**Description:** Woven realities. The integral relationship between nature, and the new forms that nature takes on in the urban



environment. The Artist has used steel, stone and found objects to demonstrate coexisting, intersecting elements between human and nature. The viewer can witness the tree in it's entirety, including the root system as it pushes through the slab, forms into a tree and reaches for the sky.
